Literacy

- * To show awareness of rhyme and alliteration.
- * To recognise rhyme in spoken words.
- * To listen to and join in with stories.
- * To give meaning to marks they make as they draw, write and paint.
- * To hear and say the initial sounds in words.
- * To link sounds to letters, naming and sounding the letters of the alphabet.

Personal, Social, Emotion Development

- * To form relationships with children and familiar adults.
- * To show affection and concern for people who are special to them.
- * To play in a group extending and elaborating play ideas.
- * To select and use activities and resources independently.

Understanding of the World

- * To learn that they have similarities and differences that connect them to, and distinguish them from others.
- * To remember and talk about significant events in their own lives.
- * To know how to operate simple equipment.
- * To enjoy playing with small world models.

Physical Development

- * To move freely, confidently and with pleasure in a range of ways.
- * To run skilfully and negotiate space successfully, adjusting speed or direction to avoid obstacles.
- * To draw lines and circle using gross motor movements.
- * To use one handed tools and equipment.
- * To understand that equipment and tools have to be used safely.

Mathematics

- * To use some number names and number language spontaneously.
- * To recite numbers in order to 10.
- * To begin to match numeral and quantity correctly.
- * To show an interest in numerals in the environment.
- * To show an interest in shape and space by playing with shapes or making arrangements with objects.
- * To show awareness of shapes in the environment.

Communication and Language

- * To listen to others one to one or in a small group, when conversation interests them.
- * To listen to stories with increasing attention and recall.
- * To develop an understanding of simple concepts.
- * To use language as a powerful means of sharing feelings, experiences and thoughts.

Expressive Arts & Design

- * To enjoy joining in with dancing and ring games.
- * To sing familiar songs.
- * To begin to move rhythmically.
- * To develop a preference for means of expression.
- * To use various construction material.
- * To understand that tools can be used for a purpose.

- To practise the phonemes your child has learnt.
- To support your child to complete their homework every week.
- To practise the target in your child's mental maths passport.
- To practise reading and writing the high frequency words with actions.
